It has now been a number of weeks since the empty tomb, since we proclaimed "Alleluia. Christ is risen. The Lord is risen indeed. Alleluia." Yet, it doesn't really feel like much has really changed, does it? We are getting used to living in

a post Easter world, the weather is getting better, the year is progressing, but have our daily lives changed much? Are we still essentially living the same way that we did before Easter? Isn't the news 'He is risen!' enough to change our lives forever? If I look at my own life critically, I ask myself why I am not living the resurrection more fully, more powerfully, more joyously than I am, after all, "The Lord is risen indeed. Alleluia." Yet I still have the same problems, and the same issues I did before Easter.

But there are some very good points that we need to remember here. Christ's resurrection is a big deal; the empty tomb is a life changing event; the resurrection does make a difference in our lives; (and, now here is the point which I think we are all in danger of missing), it also takes time.

It is not a one-time event. It's something that we grow into. We evolve into resurrected people through our relationships and the circumstances of our lives. Every day we are stepping into the resurrected life. Nobody said it would be easy, in fact, it has been pointed out to us, on numerous occasions, that Christianity can be a hard path.

So maybe you are in a place where you are depressed, or lonely, or burdened down by one of the myriad of problems that can affect us all at any time. Instead of that being a bad thing, instead, maybe we should see it as a starting point. This is the point at which Jesus enters your locked upper room. The resurrection isn't just a collection of facts, it is a story, a growing, living story, and how we live our part of that story, with Jesus, that is the resurrection story. The depths of despair, or sadness, of disappointment, that is where Jesus turns up and we share in that story with Him.

So, don't be surprised that nothing really seems to change and the world before or after Easter seems the same. As Christians, we are charged to go out into the world in His name, and live our part of the resurrection story, with Him. The first thing Jesus said to the disciples when he appeared to them in the locked upper room was 'Peace be with you.' Even as I write those words, I can feel the emotions well up inside me. After all that happened to Jesus, the first thing he said was 'Peace be with you.' And as if to emphasise the point, he said it again. 'Peace be with you.' So, when we greet each other with the words 'peace be with you.' So, when we greet each other with the words 'peace be with you', we should bear in mind what Christ meant when he said it to his friends, but also that in accepting that peace, we have been sent out, and that Jesus is with us, every step of the way.


# Millennium Green Update

We recently had our AGM, held in the church due to the inclement weather. Fortunately, due to a recent spell of better weather after the wettest March recorded with only 4 dry days during the month, we have now been able to cut the grass, clean the play equipment and trim the boundaries.

We are hoping to start the new permanent building on the Millennium Green in the next couple months, once the ground is firmer, and we are looking to be able to share more details of this, and AGM minutes and Accounts and history of the Green on the Village website.

Our green was set up by villagers and is overseen by trustees for the whole of the village, as part of the national Millennium Greens project. It is a charitable trust run by the trustees for the benefit of the community to maintain a green open space. It is financed by fundraising, Ioan of equipment such as Marquees, donations or grants. The parish council have supported the green with grants for the insurance of the play equipment, emptying of the waste and other projects, but the council is not responsible for the management of the green in any way and as such any concerns should be directed to the current trustees, namely Jane Hill Chair, Anthony French, Jenna Bryant, Lyn Edwards, James French, Tom Hill and Sam Kirkwood.

The access to the site is limited and access is only from the Kingsteignton direction, this is not going to be suitable for a growing successful business that will bring in potentially large horse boxes. Paragraph 3.1.1 of the Appraisal refers to "access to the site via an existing gated entrance". There has been no planning permission granted for a new access with a driveway banked either side with earth leading on to a 60mph road. We request that the proposal be referred to the TDC Biodiversity Officer for comment, as this is a retrospective application and there has been no bat or wildlife surveys carried out. The parish council does want to support new and developing businesses
	in the area but are concerned in this case, it is perhaps not the most suitable site for this business.
	The applicants were attending the meeting and introduced themselves. In response to the comments already submitted by the PC, they explained that the land was not livery or riding stables and the covenant was removed moved when the previous owners sold the land. They had been advised that a biodiversity survey was not needed as their proposal was temporary however, the applicants considered biodiversity at the heart of all that they do. They explained that they had reinstated the existing gateway and that it would only be in occasional use.
	The PC felt that it was difficult to support retrospective applications, particularly when ecological surveys were not carried out and would ask that TDC request that these surveys are required, whether submitting retrospective or standard applications.
	A summary of the applicants' response to be sent to TDC as an addition to our previous comments.

	On February 7 <sup>th</sup> 2024 a new recovery plan aligning to national priorities, and ensuring the needs of our local communities are being prioritised. This plan is an important next step in improving patient access to NHS dental care and supporting dental services to return to pre- pandemic levels of activity.
	Supported by £200m of new government investment, the plan sets out how we will grow the workforce, including providing targeted funding for dentists to work in areas that have historically struggled to recruit and retain staff, raising the minimum Unit of Dental Activity value to £28 to help make NHS work more attractive to dental teams, and offering dental practices a new patient premium payment to treat patients who have not been seen for over two years.
	To attract new NHS dentists and improve access to care in areas with the highest demand, around 240 dentists will be offered one off payment of up to £20,000 for working in under-served areas paid over three years. ### SUSTAINABLE IDEFORD A-Z O is for Organic



Organic describes things that are natural or related to nature. It can also describe foods grown without artificial pesticides or

fertilisers. In other uses the term can mean living things or material that comes from living things.

# Organic Food

In a nutshell organic food is made by working with nature, using real ingredients, with animals free to forage and graze on land that's home to more wildlife. It is also a fully traceable system that is governed by legal standards and subject to statutory control. The organic system is not perfect by any means but in general terms it is kinder to the planet and more sustainable. Although the price has dropped in recent years it will always be more expensive than conventional products. On the whole organic food tastes better, is produced less intensively and with less potential for exploitation of land or producers. When one argues that organic food is too expensive, the reality is that non organic food is too cheap. Often there's a hidden cost paid by the environment or by the workers who produced it.

## **Organic Fashion**

The search for organic food products has led to demand for organic clothing, specifically cotton. Synthetic fabrics are by and large made from oil, are plastic based and therefore not biodegradable and can shed plastic microfibres when they are washed. Fortunately more and more brands are starting to offer organic options to their consumers. Sustainable and ethically produced organic cotton is a fantastic alternative to conventional cotton. It is grown without pesticides from seeds that have not been genetically modified and with fewer pesticides. The clothes we wear are safer for us since they don't contain a cocktail of chemicals often found in conventional cotton garments. The dyes used are usually more eco friendly too. They reduce harm to the planet and to people. However beware of fashion brands which claim to be organic but are still not addressing other vital issues.

If you want to have a more positive impact on people and the planet the way to go is to buy less, choose well and make it last.

# Living Churchyards

The PCC have begun work on the greening of St Mary's Churchyard in an effort to increase bio-diversity.

We have sought the guidance of an Exeter Diocese Advisor and he has provided us with an in depth report and many suggestions for our Churchyard. As the Churchyard is closed, it is officially managed by



Teignbridge Council but the PCC will be working closely with the Council to establish a plan for management. The overall action plan will not be completed in a year, it's a long term plan with goals hoping to be achieved each year, and we'll be learning from what is already working well.

Our aim for this year is to incorporate small islands of longer, uncut swathes of grass, plant more bulbs on the right hand side of the path up to Church and we'd also like to create a raised bed containing biblical herbs. Last year work was started to create the mini-meadows on older graves as well as the wild flower area to the left of the Lychgate and saplings were planted to create a hedge on the roadside. This year we also hope to establish a Bug Hotel to create a safe haven for bugs, small birds and frogs and to plant a few varieties of Devon fruit trees too. To enjoy the nature in this calm and peaceful space, an area for contemplation with a bench has been identified.

The PCC will be working closely with Sustainable Ideford and the Wildlife Wardens on this project and would welcome any offers of help or any financial donations towards bulbs, trees or the bench.
