

I was recently sent the attached picture by a friend who was not having a good day....the caption said it all! We all have days like that don't we? When we are like 'a bear with a sore head'; Days when things go from bad to worse; when we are at the absolute end of our tether and want to throw in the towel.

As I mused over my friend, I remembered a book I had read called Mountains of Spices by Hannah Hurnard with a main character named Mrs. Dismal Forebodings.

The book opens with an amazing description of a perfect springtime day filled with sunshine and fragrant air a gentle breeze over fresh green fields, blossoms and blooms, a glistening winding river, bees and butterflies and frolicking newborn animals.

The reader is however, quickly taken into the shadows of a dark wood of twisted old trees and where stood a dilapidated old cottage surrounded by weeds and sickly-looking cabbage plants; all the windows and doors are tightly shut and a mere whisper of smoke is coming from the chimney as if ashamed to show itself on such a perfect day. Inside cowering over the smoky fire sat Dismal Forebodings dressed in dreary clothes and wrapped in an even drearier grey shawl, her face showing deep misery and gloom.

The contrast between the locations is strong and powerful but so also is the contrast between Dismal and her neighbour who comes calling. Mrs Valiant is happy, bustling and literally full of the joys of spring and she tries to entice Dismal outside to sample the delights of the perfect day. Dismal blankly refuses to leave her cottage, happy to sit and brood on her unhappiness.

We have choices, do we not?

Habakkuk 3:17-18.....Even though the fig trees have no blossoms, and there are no grapes on the vines; even though the olive crop fails, and the fields lie empty and barren; even though the flocks die in the fields, and the cattle barns are empty,

YET..... I will rejoice in the Lord! I will be joyful in the God of my salvation!

Looking at the lot facing Habakkuk, he could have been excused for echoing the sentiments of the bear in the picture or for being like Dismal and refusing to face another day even one as beautiful as was outside her own front door. And yet.....!!!

Habakkuk begins with a sigh but ends with a song!! When times are at their hardest looking to God is the very best strategy.

God's heart is..... to bestow on them a crown of beauty instead of ashes; the oil of joy instead of mourning; and a garment of praise instead of a spirit of despair. (Isaiah 6:3)

God wants to remind us of His love and good plans for us; His desire for us to be joyful and worshipful - to put on a garment of praise. When we are going through difficult circumstances, it can certainly be challenging to set our minds and hearts to give praise. But passages like this remind us that God is our Saviour and Comforter, who has done amazing things for us already and continues doing new and good things in our lives.

Becoming a person of praise no matter what is going on in our lives, starts with the decision to turn our eyes towards Him and trust Him; The decision to turn our eyes away from the circumstances which pull us down. Turning to praise is the best weapon we have.

I pray that you can open the windows and doors of your heart and let in the sunshine.

Thirteen bat species detected in Ideford News from the Wildlife Wardens

When we carried out the wildlife survey in the parish, many residents reported seeing bats. To gain a better understanding, we recently placed an ultrasound recorder for three nights in a garden on Butts Lane. This was part of the annual bat survey conducted by Devon Wildlife Trust, who lent the equipment.

The results were very impressive. Of the 17 bat species found in the UK, 13 were picked up by the recorder. There were over a thousand passes altogether (this doesn't mean a thousand bats, as the same bat could be passing several times), of which the great majority were Common Pipistrelles. But there were also:

- Barbastelle
- Brandt's
- Greater and Lesser Horseshoe
- Nathusius and Soprano Pipistrelle
- Leisler
- Brown and Grey Long-eared
- Natterer's
- Noctule
- Serotine

These results suggest that there is a Pipistrelle roost nearby. At this time of year, it would be a maternity roost, where the mother bats give birth to and raise their pups. If anyone has seen a lot of small bats emerging from a hole (probably in a building) at dusk, that is probably the roost, so please let us know. The other species will be roosting further away and passing by on the hunt for moths and other insects. No doubt the Greater Horseshoes are from the major roost in Chudleigh.

It is great to know that so many bat species are present in the parish, so let's keep it that way. There are many things we can do in our houses and gardens that will help the bats. We'll give some top tips in the next Parish News.

Many thanks to Sam and Lizzie for allowing us to put the detector in their garden.

Bonfires

The Parish Council have received several concerns from parishioners about bonfires in the village.

Environmental Protection UK have produced a document which gives some excellent advice and guidance about bonfires, what can and cannot be burnt, some of their effects, how to dispose of waste more environmentally, how to complain etc. This can be found at:

If you do have a bonfire please follow the good bonfire guidelines:

- Only burn dry material.
- Never burn household rubbish, rubber tyres or anything containing plastic, foam or paint.
- Avoid lighting a fire in unsuitable weather conditions smoke hangs in the air on damp, still days. If it is too windy, smoke blows into neighbours' gardens and windows and across roads.
- Avoid burning when air pollution levels in your area are high or very high. You can check air quality on 0800 556677 or at http://uk-air.defra.gov.uk.
- Keep your fire away from trees, fences and buildings.
- Never use oil, petrol or methylated spirits to light a fire you could damage yourself as well as the environment.
- Never leave a fire unattended or leave it to smolder put it out.

I is for Insulation

It is often said that the best way to reduce emissions from heating our homes, while saving money at the same time, is to insulate them better. But where and how you put the insulation is not a straightforward matter.

The first question is: Where is the heat being lost? Here are some estimates for an average home from Ovo Energy:

Walls	30-40%	
Roof	About 25%	
Windows and doors	15-20%	
Floor	About 10%	

The second question is: What's the best form of insulation? We describe some options below.

Wall insulation

If your house has cavity walls, they can usually be insulated by injecting insulation material into the cavity from the outside. A specialist company will drill holes, inject insulation and then seal the holes with cement.

But solid walls can be insulated too – either from the inside or the outside. This will cost more than insulating a standard cavity wall, but the savings on your heating bills will be bigger too.

Floor insulation

Timber floors can be insulated by lifting the floorboards and laying mineral wool insulation, supported by netting, between the joists.

Loft insulation

If access is easy and your loft joists are regular, you can use rolls of mineral wool insulation. The first layer is laid between the joists – the horizontal beams that make up the floor of the loft – then another layer is laid at right angles to cover the joists and make the insulation up to the required depth.

Energy efficient glazing

There are many different forms of double (or triple) glazing. Existing windows can be replaced with double-glazed uPVC frames, or with hardwood frames, which are more expensive. Or you can leave the existing windows and fix a secondary window a few inches further back (this is better for shutting out noise as well).

We haven't tried to give guidance on costs or benefits, as these vary so much with the type and construction of the home and how well/badly insulated it is to start with. Before embarking on any of these options, it is best to seek advice from a reputable installer (or preferably two or three). There is general advice on the Energy Saving Trust website. Also, Exeter Community Energy (ECOE) will visit your home, assess your needs, and advise you what to do under their Retrofit in Devon scheme. But even if the financial attractiveness is unclear, you can be sure that insulation will contribute to fighting climate change.

If you are not planning to spend substantial sums, here are two much cheaper options:

Insulating curtains

Special insulating curtain linings (available from Trago or on-line) are great for cold winter evenings.

Personal insulation

If you wear layers of suitable clothes that trap air inside and between each layer of material, it will save a lot of money for a relatively low outlay. There is some highly effective clothing available, such as merino wool vests, neck warmers, lined trousers, etc. The initial cost is a fraction of the savings you can make by keeping your body warm and turning down the heating.
