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

#### From the Rectory

The church celebrates Easter for 50 days from Easter Sunday itself until Pentecost (28th May 2023). All Sundays in that time are reminders of the resurrection when joy and hope overcome death and despair. We say "Christ is Risen" and the response is "He is risen indeed!" Pentecost is the day when God gave the Holy Spirit an ever-living part of Himself for generations to come, for all time. It is the day when humanity could freely converse and there were no language barriers or misunderstandings as people of many nationalities chatted freely and understand one another. The Holy Spirit is the dynamic force that each Christian is given at their baptism and Jesus said it would mean that we too could do the things that he did.

At services during this Easter period we hear stories from the Acts of the Apostles written by Luke. These are some of my favourite and reassuring parts of the Bible. They vividly tell of the first followers of the Way, later called Christians, as they bump along trying to live out Christ's teaching. It was by no means plain sailing with real suffering in the community as Saul continued to "breathe threats and murder the disciples of the Lord" (9.1) In following Jesus the early community vowed to be of "one heart and soul" so that "there wasn't a needy person among them" (Acts 4). Human nature being what it is this didn't always work. Ananias and his wife Sapphira sold their property to give all of it to church members and then lied about keeping money back for themselves. They both suffered sudden death which shocked the community. It wasn't keeping the money but the deception that was cause for concern with events like this forming its values. Many were converted by the apostles preaching from the lowly to Philip the powerful Ethiopian.

Jesus followers then just like his followers today were a dysfunctional and at times cranky group of people trying to live their best life guided by prayer and the Holy Spirit. Somehow the story spread and the baton passed to future generations.

Christianity isn't for the accomplished, the best or the greatest it is for everyone. Jesus said "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden is light". Why don't you join a local Christian community – we would love to welcome your presence.



#### Sustainable Ideford A - Z H is for Heatwaves

This spring, the world's oceans reached a temperature not seen since at least 1982 and the World Meteorological Organisation thinks it is almost certain that one of the next five years will be the hottest on record. Two forces are working together: global warming and the transition from a weather pattern called El Niña to its opposite, El Niño. For the last three years, El Niña has restrained the rise in temperature caused by greenhouse gases, but El Niño will intensify their effect.

Last year we had a very dry summer with spells of extreme heat. The temperature went above 40°C for the first time in the UK (in Lincolnshire) and despite the cooling effect of El Niña, the average UK temperature, day and night, winter and summer, exceeded 10° for the first time. Devon avoided record -breaking temperatures, reaching 33.8° on 18 July, below the record of 35.4° set in 1990, but we may not be so lucky next time.

The Met Office is cautious about forecasting more heatwaves this summer, but our advice is to be prepared for some very hot weather: if it doesn't come during this summer, it may well come in the next. And those high sea temperatures make storms and flooding more likely too.

What can we in Ideford and neighbouring villages do about this? We have to recognise that much of the change is now irreversible. Even if the hope of limiting global warming to 1.5° is met, we will not go back to what we used to think of as normal weather. It's more a matter of damage limitation and stopping things getting even worse.

There are many things that only governments can do and it's our job to put pressure on them to deliver on what they have promised. But some things are more directly in our control.

Conserving water will become more and more important: SW Water said in April that reservoir levels were 17% lower than the same time last year. So it's worth checking which programme on your washing-machine and dishwasher (if you use one) uses the least water. Last month we gave some hints about water-butts and channelling water from the shower to the garden. We also need to be more wary about wildfires: we have got used to the idea that we live in a damp region where wildfires are impossible, but this may not be the case in future. So bonfires are definitely out in drought periods and barbecues have to be used with caution.

What would make the biggest impact, though, would be if all of us understood how our everyday activities created greenhouse gas emissions, and took steps to reduce them. Sustainable Ideford has plans to help residents do just this. Watch this space!
