

A message from Father Mark Skelton

As I am writing this we are just entering into the holiest of weeks as we prepare to reflect on Christ's suffering and death. However, if that was all we were doing, if our reflections ended on Good Friday with a bloodstained Cross or even ended on Holy Saturday with a cold and barricaded tomb then, as St Paul says, we would, of all people, deserve to be the most pitied. But, (and I know you are not supposed to start a sentence with 'but'), that is not where our reflection ends. Our Faith takes us far deeper, it brings us into the tomb and says, that is not the end, it cannot possibly be the end.

Consider all the life and love and laughter you have shared over the last weeks and months. For us to say that just drains away into the metaphorical sand and is lost, makes love, our friendships, indeed any relationship a transitory thing, a short term thing...but that is not the way of the eternal God, He does not waste such gifts. He gives them to us, not just for a time but for all time and beyond. Think of all the sadness, or injustice or loneliness...all these things cannot possibly be the pinnacle of a life. We do not understand why some suffer so much but what we can begin to grasp is that the God we follow, the God who had to endure His own Son's horrific suffering, raised Jesus from that horror and agony and loneliness. He will not let that sadness be the full stop of any life.

As Eastertide continues with all its joy and colour and faith there are so many people for whom this is not their norm. People are struggling with the cost of living, with personal trauma, perhaps with a sadness for the state of the world and its wars or injustice or crises. We, as Christians, have an enormous role to play in our society. Not as 'bible bashers' who lose sight of the spirit of Christ in our haste to criticize, nor as judgemental critics who find fault everywhere but as men and women of encouragement and of hope. People who truly are an Easter People, I am always struck in the Resurrection appearances of the Lord that they never recognize Him until He does something or says something. His physical appearance is not what makes Him, Him.

Let's carry that with us this Eastertide. Perhaps you will be the Risen Christ for someone, perhaps something you say or you do will give hope, new life, real joy to someone who is most in need.

God bless you and a very happy Eastertide to you all.

Linking up to Chudleigh Wild

Driving through Chudleigh, you may have noticed signs asking drivers to look out for hedgehogs. These have been put up by Chudleigh Wild, a large and active wildlife group. Ideford Wildlife Wardens are developing links with Chudleigh Wild, so that the two neighbouring parishes can work for wildlife together. There are three immediate opportunities, which we are taking up. They are open to any reader of the Parish News.

- 1. You can help track the flightpath of greater horseshoe bats, using bat detectors lent by Chudleigh Wild. There is a major roost of these rare bats in Chudleigh and they are known to fly over our parish.
- 2. You can join the annual orchid count. There are several different orchid species growing in great numbers, in fields by the A38 slip-roads.
- 3. You can join the WhatsApp group Chudleigh Wild Birds. Here people record sightings of unusual birds or the arrival of migrants, ask questions about behaviour which experts answer, and so on.

For the first two, newcomers are teamed up with an experienced person, so it's a good way to learn.

015/23 Cont.	Council meetings are still being held at Buckland Athletic as the work to make the Brunel offices carbon free continues. It is expected that meetings will resume there in April.
	The budget has been approved and the share of the council tax payable in Teignbridge now stands at \pounds 5.54 for the next year, an increase of 2.99 per cent - well below the rate of inflation. The council also decided that its car parks will be free after 6 pm. for the net four years with a charge of \pounds 1. only on Sundays. Funds were also reserved for council housing, climate emergency, jobs initiative and Tidy Teignbridge The most concerning issue is that it has to deal with a revenue deficit of \pounds 3 million which will require exploring ways of saving money. With elections coming soon it is believed that the council will be looking for new councillors to replace those not standing, probably about twelve.
	Cllr B Austen updated her report by confirming that there were now up to fifteen vacancies at TDC and if anyone was interested in filling any of the vacancies it was a demanding, but worthwhile role. Cllr Austen finished by announcing that she was considering not standing for election in May and that it had been a pleasure coming to Ideford over the <i>years</i> .
016/23	 PARISH MATTERS 016.1 It was suggested that notices be put up in Town Farm Lane to educa dog owners to put their dog waste in a bin. TDC to be asked if they would be prepared to empty a dog bin if it we placed in the narrower part of Town Farm Lane. It was proposed by ClIr A Carter-Woodwark, seconded by ClIr D Fox a agreed by the majority (one abstention) to start paying the full cost of emptying the dog bin on the M Green. Contributing towards the proposed hardstanding at the M Green was deferred. O16.2 It was proposed by ClIr A Carter-Woodwark, seconded by ClIr D F and agreed by all to invite interest from residents on receiving commemorative medallions for the Kings Coronation. O16.3 Plans for Coronation celebrations and a summer fete are still in the early stages and PC discussion was deferred. O16.4 Comments for the Teignbridge Local Plan 2020 – 2040: ClIr A Carter-Woodwark commented that as so much of the current Loor Plan has not been implemented, we are very fearful that the Teignbridge Local Plan 2020 – 2040 is going to go the same way – this illustrates the dissatisfaction that parishes have with Teignbridge planning. Especially w regards to the environment, because as we know we have had challeng about the environment, our wildlife, our hedgerows and come up against brick wall and yet in the current local plan there is an enormous about te environment, yet it does not fill me with great confidence. ClIr R Peart suggested the PC invite Trevor Shaw – Senior TDC Planni Officer, to a meeting; Clerk to send an invite. O16.6 ClIr H Bellamy suggested that the PC & PCSO attend the Pop-Up Cafe's to enable them to meet more residents - Chair to discuss this at the next PACT meeting.

014/23 cont	A resident was concerned that photos sent to TDC (minute ref 007/23.3) had been taken without the landowner's knowledge or permission – the PC explained that one of the photos was historic and the other taken from the public highway. Also, the sending of the photos had not been an agenda item – the PC explained that it was a follow up request from TDC on an ongoing planning enforcement matter, a regular agenda item.	
015/23	REPORTS Clir Ron Peart Highways Management. This winter has posed challenges for the Highways and Traffic Management Service. The mix of prolonged sub-zero temperatures and heavy rain led to a rapid deterioration in the condition of the network highlighting the fragility of the asset following decades of under investment. Since April 2022 our inspection team have assessed over 27,000 reports of potholes from members of the public. Over 10,000 reports were assessed in January alone, we were receiving as many as 500 reports per day. The team have been working hard to get on top of backlog with a focus on the safety of the travelling public. Milestone our maintenance contractor, has increased their resources which has seen weekend working and over forty gangs working across the county. At the beginning of the month there was 3,000 potholes waiting to be repaired, this has reduced to approximately 2,000. Following a quiet November, in which we saw very little in the way of gritting treatment, the extended cold snaps in December and January has seen us use over 15,000 tonnes of salt across 2,094 runs the equivalent to 55 full. Countywide treatments on our Primary Salting Network. The average across the last four winters for the same period has been 8,919 tonnes and 1,597 runs. This additional work has a knock-on effect with the planned improvement works. Gritter drivers are limited in how many hours they can work which often means planned improvement works have to be deferred. In addition, with safety of the network taking priority, a number of the patching gangs have been redeployed on to potholes repairs. Again, this means planned improvements will have been deferred. Neighbourhood Officers will be in contact with Elected Members that have works impacted in their area. The resolution of drainage assets referred for additional maintenance has slowed in the last few months to support the corporate financial challenged. However, over 10,000 defects have been addressed so far this financial year	
	drainage asset defect identification. We have over 14,000 outstanding drainage assets defects across the county and works are continuing to resolve them	
	Clir B Austen Teignbridge unanimously approved motions to take positive action in communicating to all relevant authorities to save Teignmouth. Hospital from closure. It also passed a motion to oppose the proposed changes to the Wild Camping on Dartmoor.	

For the first-time empty homes in the district have fallen below 300. The Council keeps records of empty properties as they are sometimes illegally occupied, not in a fit condition for sale or of concern to neighbouring properties if condition deteriorates.

9. Grow your own veg

Eat more home-grown UK, local and seasonal fruit and vegetables from local sources or from your own garden or allotment. They will have higher nutrient content and represent fewer food miles. Picking as required will also reduce food waste.

10. Cut out pesticides

We are made increasingly aware of the long term devastation caused by Indiscriminate use of pesticides. Seek out alternative methods to protect your plants. Please note that Metaldehyde slug pellets are now banned, as they cause significant harm to wildlife. Growing seedlings in trays first may help them survive mollusc attack and choose varieties of plants less susceptible to attack from pests and diseases.

Sustainable Ideford A - Z G is for.....

'Greener' Gardens (from https://www.rhs.org.uk/gardening-for-the-environment/ planet-friendly-gardening-tips)

Living where we do we are surrounded by greenery so it is important that the way we manage our gardens compliments and compensates for the way the countryside around us is managed. Imitating what is happening in fields on our doorstep may be less valuable than adding to the portfolio of habitats and therefore the diversity of wildlife that already has a home in Ideford and surrounding villages.

10 tips for greener gardens.

- 1. **Plant a tree** (or at least avoid felling one)- great for carbon capture! Chose a species that is not common in the area around you and a native species that will extend feeding opportunities for insects and birds particularly in early spring and late autumn.
- 2. Switch from mains to rains in your garden to save carbon.

Or use washing up or bath water. Think before you pull the plug out whether that water could be useful for plants, particularly trees and shrubs in dry weather.

3. Go peat-free

Keeping peat in bogs – not bags – is a crucial part of the fight against climate change.

4. Make your own compost

Every 1kg of homemade compost typically saves over 0.1kg fossil CO2 emissions, which could save more than 5.1 kg carbon, per gardener, every year. It will also help reduce landfill and use of vehicles to transport organic waste to the recycling centre.

5. Pull up a paving slab

Garden soils and perennial plantings play an important role in storing carbon.

6. Plants for Pollinators

Pollinators need our help. Loss of habitat is one of the main reasons why we see fewer bees, butterflies and other insects visiting our gardens. Choose a wide variety of native plants that have long flowering periods and include some that flower early in spring and late in autumn.

7. Grow your own cut flowers

Some imported flowers have up to 10 x the carbon footprint of home or UKgrown bouquets. Flowers from abroad may have been cultivated using pesticides and herbicides that are banned in UK.

8. Electrify your garden

An average petrol power tool emits 0.848 kg carbon per litre of petrol used. It's not only carbon, they emit harmful particulate and noise pollution too.
